

# CITY INTELLIGENCE.

**PACING MATCH — Metairie Course.**—A brisk and exciting brush came off yesterday afternoon over the Metairie Course, between those two well-known pacing horses *Dan Rice* and *Bob Cotterell*. The amount of the match was not stated, but as both parties had lots of friends, each horse was freely backed. Dan Rice was the favorite at the start, at odds of about two to one. The day was fine and the attendance large, especially so for a week day. The race was at mile heats, best three in five, and closed with the following results:

**FUNERAL CORTÈGE.**—The remains of ex-Gov. Isaac Johnson, after having laid in state yesterday at the Verandah Hotel, were last evening removed on board of the steamboat *Emperor*, to be taken to their last resting place in East Feliciana. As a token of respect for the ex-Commander in Chief, minute guns were fired from sunrise to sunset at Place d'Armes, by order of Gen. Augustin. At 4 o'clock P. M., many members of the fraternity of Odd Fellows assembled at the Verandah Hotel, and after suitable funeral ceremonies had been performed by the officers of the order, of which the deceased was a member, the coffin was placed in the hearse.

The military portion of the cortège was under the command of Brig. Gen. Augustin. A very fine band of music added great solemnity to the occasion by the mournful dirges which were performed. A detachment from most of the military companies in the city was present; while immediately preceding the hearse were members of the Order of Odd Fellows, and the personal friends of the deceased. We noticed ex-Gov. Walker and many other distinguished citizens in the procession. On arriving at the steamboat *Emperor*, the corpse was placed on board, several volleys were fired by the military, when the large assemblage dispersed.

## RECORDER GENOIS' COURT.

**STEALING LARD.**—Capt. F. G. Whitney, master of the schooner *John Albert*, lying at the Picayune Pier, yesterday complained before Recorder Genois, that on Tuesday night four men who he will point out, stole a number of kegs of lard from his vessel. **ATTEMPT TO MOB.**—John Manning was yesterday charged before Recorder Genois with having gone on board of the steamboat *Aston*, and after having insulted and abused the officers, he threatened to return with a crowd of persons and mob the boat.

**ARMED WITH A HATCHET.**—John Blasor was yesterday arrested for carrying a hatchet concealed in his bosom, and for having pulled it out with the intention of using it, when he was turned out of a house for insulting a woman.

**ARRESTS.**—There was not an arrest made yesterday in the First District worth the trouble of reporting. A few trifling charges of assault being the only crime imputed to those who were locked up.

**DEATH OF HON. ISAAC JOHNSON.**—No business was transacted yesterday in any of the Courts in consequence of the death of Ex-Gov. Johnson, late Attorney General of the State. They all adjourned at an early hour in honor of the memory of the distinguished deceased. In the Supreme Court Attorney General Morse moved the adjournment of the Court, accompanying the motion with a few appropriate remarks. In the United States Courts U. S. District Attorney Hutton and Miles Taylor, Esq., paid brief but feeling tributes to the virtues of the deceased.
