

Death of Andre L. Roman.

There died yesterday morning in St. James parish a gentleman who was personally known to thousands of the inhabitants of New Orleans, and who in many respects was a typical Louisianian. Mr. Andre L. Roman, the son of Judge Alfred Roman of the criminal district court, is no more. The deceased was the only living child of Judge Roman's marriage with Miss Fellicie Aime, the daughter of Valcour Aime, of French origin but a native Louisianian, one of the wealthiest and kindest men in the state.

Andre L. Roman was born in St. James parish in 1851. He received a classical education and in early life entered the journalistic ranks. He was city editor of the New Orleans Bee for seven years and afterwards edited the "Rappel Louisianais," a French paper published in St. James parish, and "Le Trait d'Union," a daily evening French paper published in this city. Mr. Roman was a cultivated gentleman and a finished English and French scholar. He was a forcible writer in both languages. Conspicuous among his many other admirable qualities—talented, lion-hearted and honorable—was the virtue of courage, for which he was warmly admired by all who knew him.

The news of his death when it reached the city caused a pang of sorrow in the hearts of his numerous friends. The deceased leaves a wife to mourn his loss. To her and to Judge Roman the Picayune tenders its heartfelt sympathies.
