### Clairborne G. Thibodaux, Thibodaux,

Thibodaux, La., July 4.—(Special.)—Last night, at the residence of his sister, Maliam Maronge, on Jackson street, Thibodaux, Mr. Clairborne G. Thibodaux died, aged 68 years. Deceased was a native, and was always a resident of this vicinity. He was a grandson of the Hon. Henry Schuyler Thibodaux, the founder of this town.

He was an excellent citizen, quiet and genial in his manner, earning the respect and friendship of all with whom he came in social contact. He lost his wife several years ago, who left him one son, now grown, to lament his departure to the unknown world.

Mr. Thibodaux was a Christian gentleman, and after receiving the consolations of his church, passed peacefully away, after an illness of several weeks. He was buried this evening in St. Joseph's Catholic cemetery by the side of his family and ancestors who preceded him to the tomb.

Mr. Thibodaux was a confederate soldier, bearing an unblemished record, a member of Company D, Twenty-sixth Louisiana Infantry, Captain C. Lagarde, in which he was promoted to be a corporal. He served honorably in that command until it was captured at Vicksburg on July 4, 1863—thirty-two years ago.

Deceased was a member of Braxton Bragg Camp No. 196, United Confederate Veterans, of the valley of the Lafourche.

### Mmes. E. H. Kilpatrick and S. M. Lyle, Meridian.

Meridian, Miss., July 5.—(Special.)—Mrs. E. H. Kilpatrick, an aged widow living about one and a half miles northeast of the city, near the asylum, died this morning after a short illness, resulting from extreme old age. She was 85 years of age and has been living in this county for over half a century. Her husband was an officer in the Mexican war, in which he was killed. His widow drew a pension from the government on this account. The funeral will be held to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock. Burial at Semmes graveyard.

Mrs. Sallie M. Lyle, wife of J. T. Lyle, a prominent wholesale grocer of this city, died at the family residence last night, the result of a complication of diseases. She leaves a husband and several small children to mourn her loss. The funeral services were held at the First Baptist church this afternoon at 5 o'clock. Interment at Rosehill cemetery.

### Lyman Lyon, Abbeville.

Abbeville, La., July 5.—(Special.)—Mr. Lyman Lyon died this morning at 7:30 o'clock, at the residence of his brother-in-law, Dr. W. A. White, aged 52 years. He was one of the leading, influential men and has resided here since early life. He was at one time deputy clerk of the court, under Hon. L. Broussard. He held the responsible position with honor from the year 1806 to 1875, when he ran for the sheriff's office of this parish and was elected. He has held other offices of trust, being at one time parish judge and justice of the peace, while Mr. Alphonse LeBlanc was sheriff. He held the position of deputy under him and it was while filling this place that he was stricken down the last time. He leaves a father, three brothers, three sisters and five children to mourn his loss. He will be buried here in Abbeville to-morrow. The funeral will take place at 10 o'clock from the residence of his brother-in-law, Dr. W. A. White.

### Alexander Hester, Chicago.

Chicago, July 5.—Alexander Hester, who was Chicago's first photographer, died to-day at an advanced age. Mr. Hester was a famous daguerotypist and became prominent in the '50's through his pictures about the vicinity of the present site of Minneapolis. In 1851 he gave a view of the falls at that place to a brother of Charles Sumner, the statesman, who in turn gave it to the poet Longfellow. Some time later he received one of the first copies of Hiawatha, with an autograph letter of thanks for his picture from Longfellow, who declared that the picture had inspired the poem.

### Joseph Egan, Ocean Springs.

Ocean Springs, Miss., July 5.—(Special.) Mr. Joseph Egan, a native of New York city, who has been spending some months here, the guest of his uncle, Mr. James Lynch, died last night at 6:30 o'clock of heart trouble. Mr. Egan was 20 years of age and came here in search of health. The funeral took place from the Catholic church at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

### Robert B. Kennedy, Clinton.

Clinton, La., July 5.—(Special.)—Robert B. Kennedy, who has for several years been the chief deputy in the sheriff's office, died at his home here last night. He was one of the most popular and influential citizens of this parish and his death is deeply deplored.

### Mother St. Gabriel, Houston.

Houston, Tex., July 5.—Mother St. Gabriel, founder and mother superior of the Convent of Incarnate Word, of this city, died this morning at Galveston, aged 47. Her name was Mary Jane Dillon, and was born in Dublin, Ireland.
