Mississippi have reached an acute stage, and, from indications tonight, it will change from interviews about the concealment of cases to a much more serious matter. From information that has come to hand, the dignity of the State of Louisiana has been offended by an armed invasion from the sister state, and this morning Governor Blanchard communicated with the Captain of the naval brigade, which has a fully equipped gunboat, with a view of having it dispatched to the borders to protect Louisiana citisens from further indignities.

Mississippi has five armed boats patrolling the coast to prevent fishermen from further indignities.

The Mississippi bas five armed boats patrolling through the quarantine lines. These vessels are also assisted by the United States revenue cutter Winona. The Mississippi boats will not allow Louisiana fishermen to enter Mississippi Bound, east of St. Joseph Light, but, from reports received here, it appears that one of these patrol boats came into Lake Borgue, which is distinctly Louisiana territory, and one report says it came up to the mouth of Lake Borgue canal, which extends from the lake to the Mississippi River, a distance of only 4½ miles. A private dispatch was received in the city today stating that Mississippi soldiers employed as quarantine guards had invaded Louisiana with arms, and that boats were patrolling the mouth of Rogliets Lake and Pearl Rover, off the Louisiana coast, to prevent Louisiana boats from leaving.
Governor Blanchard directed Brigadier-General Perraliat, of his staff, and Captain J. W. Bostwick, commanding the state's naval militia, to investigate and report. He also telegraphed Governor Vardaman, of Mississippi, as follows:
"Have reliable information that Mississippi quarentine guards, armed, crossed over to Louisiana side at Pearl River. I do not believe this was on orders, but was the thoughties conduct merely of a few. To obvicts unfavorable comment and friction, please give orders that your guards remain on their own side of the line."
