

## ANOTHER CHAPTER.

**Governor Kellogg to Be Reinstated in the State House at 12 O'clock To-day.**

**His Former Government to Be Replaced in Every Detail.**

**General Emory Has Now Here Twenty-five Companies of Infantry, Three Batteries of Eighteen Guns, and Four Companies of Artillery.**

**Governor Kellogg's Proclamation.**

The following communication was addressed yesterday afternoon by Major General Emory to Governor Kellogg:

DEPARTMENT OF THE GULF, }  
New Orleans, La., Sept. 18, 1874. }

To His Hon. W. P. Kellogg, Governor of the State of Louisiana

SIR—In obedience to the orders of the President, I have the honor to inform you of the surrender of the insurgents, lately in arms against the State government, and to afford you the necessary military support to re-establish the State government. Very respectfully, your obedient servant,

Immediately on receipt of the foregoing, a letter, of which the following is a copy, was transmitted in reply:

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 18, 1874.

Major General W. H. Emory, Commanding:

SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of this date informing me that you are prepared to afford me the necessary military support to re-establish the State government. I will promulgate an executive order in the official journal to-morrow morning instructing all officers of the State who have been prevented from performing their duties, to resume their functions at once.

Owing to the disorganization of the police force in New Orleans, resulting from the recent conflict of arms, the Commissioners of the Metropolitan Police will not be able to get their officers on their beats until to-morrow. Therefore I must request you to assume the maintenance of the peace and order of the city during the coming night.

The following is a copy of a document which was written last evening:

[EXECUTIVE ORDER.]

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 18, 1874.

All State officers who have been prevented during the recent troubles from performing their duties will immediately resume their official functions.

The Board of Metropolitan Police will at once assemble and organize the police force of New Orleans and assume the maintenance of the peace and order of the city. W. P. KELLOGG, Governor.

A representative of the TIMES was reliably informed last evening that in accordance with the programme, which is explained by the foregoing correspondence, Governor Kellogg will resume possession of the State House to-day at noon.

To-Day,

it is proposed that Gov. Kellogg's Private Secretary will take possession of the Executive office at the State House, and the State Adjutant General will receive the State arms, munitions, etc. Gov. Kellogg himself will probably be in attendance all day up on the Committee of Conference.

The Troops

now here comprise the entire third infantry, together with detachments of the second, sixteenth and eighteenth regiments of infantry, and companies of the first and third artillery regiments. There were fourteen pieces of artillery here last night and more are due this morning.
