New York, Feb. 20 --- The president of the American Jewish Committee said Wednesday that negotiations of claims against Germany for Jewish losses suffered under Hitler will begin about March 15 🔄 in a neutral country.

The committee president, Jacob Blaustein of Baltimore, arrived by plane today from London. He said the presidium of the conference on Jewish material claims decided at a Paris meeting to begin negotiations with the Bonn government.

The five-man presidium, he said, has the responsibility of negotiating for the conference, which is made up of 22 representative American and overseas Jewish or-


