

### CYR TAKES OATH LAYING BASIS FOR ACTION IN COURTS

#### Claimant to Office of Governor Creates Stir in Baton Rouge

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Cyr in Baton Rouge Tuesday morning, the latter having proceeded to the capital by train from New Orleans.

**Creates Furore**  
The report that Dr. Cyr had left New Orleans Tuesday morning brought out the state guards in Baton Rouge in full force and he was continually under surveillance of a detail of state highway police during his stay in the capital. From the train he went to the Heidelberg hotel, where he lunched and after lunch created a furore when he went to the Louisiana National Bank building, in which the Louisiana Highway Commission is housed, and got in an elevator. With Judge Wortham, he went to the law offices of State Senator Charles A. Holcombe, which are on the 10th floor of the building.

After some consultation there Judge Wortham and Dr. Cyr went to the office of the clerk of court in the courthouse where Miss Stone signed the notarial oath of office for Dr. Cyr. Judge Wortham then put the oath in his pocket and with Dr. Cyr left the building in the direction of the postoffice.

The city hall lies directly between the courthouse and the postoffice and this being the most direct route Dr. Cyr and Judge Wortham followed it entering the city hall from the rear.

**Highway Police in Force**  
As they entered in the front of the building, highway aides appeared from both sides of the building and from the building itself. Dr. Cyr stopped in front of the building and chatted with Mayor Wade H. Eby and others while Judge Wortham mailed a registered letter to Mr. King making formal demand for the office and attempted to file the oath with the secretary of state in the old state house.

Reaching the state house two guards posted in front of the east door shuffled a little as Judge Wortham entered, accompanied by newspaper representatives. He was greeted inside by a half dozen additional agents, turning into the office of the secretary of state still other administration agents greeted him.

Judge Wortham spoke to Richard H. Flower, assistant secretary of state.

"Is there anything I can do for you?" Mr. Flower asked.

"I have here the oath of Paul N. Cyr, governor of the state of Louisiana. I desire to file it with you," Judge Wortham answered.

"We already have one governor's oath and have no place for another," Mr. Flower responded.

"Thank you. I just wanted to make formal tender of the oath to you," Judge Wortham accompanied Dr.

Cyr to the hotel and then to the train, discussing plans on the way. Both stated that no definite plans had been made and it was not decided definitely whether an ouster suit would be filed. At one time the attorney indicated a rehearing may be asked in the recent ouster suit decision handed down by the supreme court holding that Dr. Cyr had no right to sue in the courts for his office as governor.

"The supreme court may yet come to its senses," Judge Wortham commented earlier in the day. "Should the supreme court put its approval on anarchy? Should the supreme court rule that he who hath is the man who hath the power?"

**Not 'Starting War'**  
Dr. Cyr made it clear upon his arrival at noon that he had not come up "to start any war" and smilingly broadly commented that he had noticed that Senator Long had broken one of the rules of the Senate on his first day there by attempting to smoke a cigar. "That's just like him," he said.

Since yesterday morning "Governor" King has not left the executive mansion where he is safely reposing behind a cordon of armed guards. In addition to the mansion and the old state house, guards are posted at the highway offices in the Louisiana National bank building, at the supervisor of public accounts office and Louisiana Tax Commission offices in alumni hall on the old campus of the university and in the new state capitol.

King had no comment to make tonight upon the demand that he relinquish the office but indicated that he would have an answer tomorrow after the letter was received.

**Text of Letter**  
The text of the letter follows: "Senator Alvin O. King, Baton Rouge, La.

"I came to Baton Rouge this morning with the intention of peacefully taking charge of the governor's office and functioning as governor of Louisiana.

"If you very well know, Governor Long having now actually taken his seat in the United States Senate at Washington, there can be no longer any question that he is no longer governor of Louisiana.

"I learned on arrival in Baton Rouge that you have taken forcible possession of the executive office in the state capitol and that the seat of every department of government is guarded by armed forces.

"You very well know that I was duly elected as lieutenant-governor and held that office up to the date that Governor Long ceased to be the governor of Louisiana.

"You very well know that no other person is entitled to the governorship except myself; that you are a foreign usurper and intruder into the office and I now make formal demand upon you to vacate the office and deliver the same to me.

### PLAN FOR TAXING TO AID PROGRESS IS OFFERED HERE

#### Henry George Foundation Leader Addresses Real Estate Board Group

A system of taxation that would encourage progress instead of imposing a penalty upon improvements was advocated by Clayton J. Ewing of Chicago in an address before the property owners' division of the New Orleans Real Estate Board and invited guests Tuesday noon at a luncheon in the De Soto hotel.

Mr. Ewing, head of the Chicago chapter of the Henry George Foundation, an organization devoted to the advancement of the single tax idea, cited the Pittsburgh Plan, an adaptation of the single tax theory, as a practical example of what can be done by a city in improving tax conditions.

**Encourages Building**  
In the Pittsburgh plan the city tax is formulated on the principle that assessments on improvements should be 50 per cent of assessments on the land itself, he said. The system imposes a penalty on unimproved property and encourages improvement and building. In initiating such a plan the assessments on improvements are reduced gradually until the basis determined upon is reached over a period of years, he recommended that New Orleans adopt the plan, making the assessments on improvements 70 per cent less than the land assessment.

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**We do not want a return to conditions prevailing between 1917 and 1929,"** he asserted. "With our wealth in resources and enlightenment, we should be able to evolve a better type of taxation in which every man who wants to work will have an opportunity to work at a high rate of pay."

A single tax, or even an adaptation of it, such as the Pittsburgh plan, would work toward such an end by encouraging building and improvements, he asserted.

He cited figures showing the lowering in assessments accomplished in Pittsburgh and the acclaim given the plan by large industrial and civic bodies and individuals in that city.

Mr. Ewing was introduced by Alfred D. Danziger, who explained that Mr. Ewing's visit was one of service to his fellow men, as he came here without compensation. P. A. Chopin, newly elected chairman of the property owners' division, presided and announced that the organization was planning a thorough study of local conditions before deciding upon its course of action this year.

time than that required to create the rubbish heaps and should be undertaken immediately by the property owners, it was asserted. Many of the old houses of New Orleans have great historic and artistic value, as well as the ground on which they stand, but it was pointed out Tuesday that by no stretch of the imagination can such spots as an adjoining vacant lot or a yard filled with rubbish be deemed an addition to the quaintness or picturesque of New Orleans.

**No Attraction to Visitors**  
Certainly they will prove no attraction to visitors from other leading cities, who expect to find enjoyment in the inspection of the city's real architectural treasures and historic spots.

Bruce Baird, chairman of the civic bureau of the Association of Commerce, reported Tuesday that the removal of political posters from telephone poles and buildings was advancing rapidly. It was reported that 1200 men, working throughout the city, were engaged in this work throughout Tuesday.

The rain was said to have materially speeded up the removal of the posters, which became saturated and were easily torn from the telephone poles and other objects to which they were attached. The men, who were placed on the job at the request of Public Property Commissioner Joseph P. Kelly, are working only on paved streets, where Carnival visitors most likely will travel, it was announced.

All "Eyesores" Opposed  
Mr. Baird repeated that the bureau is not limiting its efforts to political posters but to have unsightly commercial posters removed as well.

Efforts to remove political posters were approved by the 17th Ward Civic League at a meeting Tuesday at the home of its president, Miss Grace Thompson, 1013 Carrollton avenue.

A request will be made that the Association of Commerce civic bureau take action against fruit dealers whose merchandise is placed on the sidewalk, the league decided. The league will ask that sidewalks be laid on Dublin street between South Claiborne avenue and Fig street and that trees be planted along both sides of Dublin street.
