



Senator Defamed Her and Caused Illegal Arrest, States Petition

This is the second court action brought against Huey P. Long personally in the East Baton Rouge courts. The other action was brought in 1922 by District Attorney John Fred Odom, charging libel as the result of the Issuance of circulars attacking John M. Parker, who was then governor. Supreme Justice H. F. Brunot, who was then district judge at Baton Rouge, found him guilty on two counts and gave him a suspended sentence of 30 days on one count and he paid a fine of \$1 on the other. Judge Brunot explained that he was making the sentence light because of Mr. Long's impulsive nature and expressed the belief that "the recollection of this trial will deter you in the future from exceeding the bonds of careful and legitimate criticism of your fellow man."
