

Huey Long Son Aims at Senate

BATON ROUGE, La., May 19 (UP).—Russell Long stepped forth in the image of his fabulous father, Wednesday and asked the people of Louisiana to send him to the Senate in November.

His election is as certain as anything ever was in politics.

It will mean a full return to power by the Long family, already installed in the governor's chair and picking up the pieces of a political organization wrecked by the Louisiana scandals.

Russell steps into the hearts of Louisiana's red hills and bayou folk as no man could unless the Kingfish himself was resurrected. He has been trained in politics since he was 16 and he bears an almost uncanny resemblance to Huey P. Long as a young man.

To make the resemblance even closer, he walks, talks and combs his hair like Huey did. Russell is only 29 but he will be 30 in time to meet the minimum age requirement for seating in the Senate next January.

His age was believed the reason his uncle, Gov. Earl Kemp Long, did not promptly name him as interim Senator to replace the late John H. Overton. Long named Millionaire Oilman William Feazel instead.
